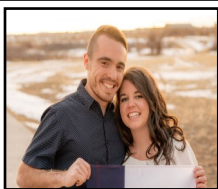

One of the things we Cru staff love to do is sending students. Sometimes that looks like sending them on a mission trip but more often than not, it's training them to be sent to reach their peers. This year we have had the privilege of training countless students in evangelism and specific ways to share their faith, especially in groups and spheres that they are already apart of. For Caleb that has meant training students on the football, track, baseball, and basketball teams to do team outreaches.

However for me (Amy), one of the students it has been the most fun to help send is Anisha. This year, I have been discipling

She is on the track team so she thought it would be cool to do a track outreach with her peers. Anisha invited her friends from the track team to come to an optional Cru meeting after practice. Each week about 14 of her track friends came to hear more about Jesus and eat pizza. We trained her how to share her testimony as well as the gospel. Over the next month, Anisha shared these things with her track friends each week. While Anisha is overall fairly shy, she shared with boldness and confidence. When sharing the gospel, she asked each of her friends whether or not they wanted to start a relationship with Jesus. Three of them prayed to receive Christ!

We are excited to continue meeting with the girls from the track team in the fall and go deeper into what it means to follow Jesus. While Anisha graduates this year, I have no doubt that God has used her presence with her friends to help impact their lives for all of eternity!

LIFE FOR CHILDREN WELFARE - ORPHANS SPONSORED BY COVENANT UMC

When the first case of covid 19 was announced in Kenya last year, The Government announced all schools and public places to be closed indefinitely to control the further spread of the infection. School going children were forced to stay at home for a period on nine months. We thank God that people adhered with the measures put in place to prevent the further spread of the disease and the infection curve went down. Early this year, the Kenyan Government and the ministry of education allowed school to be reopened for the learning process to continue. Even though the long holiday affected the learning system of the educations, students resumed back for their classes early this year and they have already learnt for the past three months. At the moment they are on holiday before they resumed back to school for their final term. Through your sponsorship and prayers, we have not had any bad report from the orphans or their guardians. They benefited with Sanitizers, hand washing equipments, face masks and nutritional support. May almighty God bless you!

FELIX OCHIENG OYUGI is in grade 8: Felix has grown a tall young boy; he is in good health together with his family members. He just sat for his grade eight final examination Kenya certificate of Primary Education (KCPE) and he scored 309 marks out of 500. This is an average performance that is going to enable him join one of the best schools in the county. Felix wishes to join Mbale high school for his secondary learning. He wants to continue putting more effort in his education and proceed to a public university. His relatives and family are all in good health and are doing fine. Felix and his family benefited with a facemask and sanitizers. May God continue blessing you as you prayerfully sponsor orphans and needy families.



ALLAN OKOTH is in grade 7: Allan is in good health together with his family members, this family benefited with a new house late last year when their house was destroyed with heavy rains. They are now living in a big and specious house through Life for children welfare support. Allan is in grade seven at St. Antony Wachara Christian School. He is an average boy academically and in his last examination he scored 310 out of 500 marks. This is an average performance even though he can achieve much better than this next time. Through your sponsorship we believe that Allan is going to make it in his education and achieve his dream career of becoming a Doctor. Allan's sister has not yet reported to collage yet, she is trusting God that he will report in September this year God willing. Thank you Covenant UMC for sponsoring Allan.

CYNTHIA AJWANG is in grade 3: Cynthia is a young beautiful girl. Cynthia is an average student academically. In her last examination: Cynthia scored above average and was recommended well by her class teacher. Being that she is still young, she is not sure of what she wants to become when she grows up, she talks of being a pilot and a Doctor. We pray and believe that her dreams are valid and that she would settle in one ambition and build on it. During her free time, Cynthia likes playing ball games with her friends. She too helps her mother with light household chores while not at school. We thank you Covenant church for accepting to sponsor Cynthia and other needy children through Life for children Ministry.



MARY GORRETY is in grade 8: Mary Gorrety has maintained her character of being polite; she is a growing to be a lady with few words and an introvert in nature. Mary sat for her grade eight National Examinations early this year, their results are already out and she managed to score 272 marks out of 500. This is an average performance which is going to secure her a chance in one of the best schools. Even though there was the outbreak of the Covid 19 which affected learning in Kenya, Mary still managed to appear among the averagely performed pupils. We are proud of her and wish her all the best. It's so sad that in 2019 Mary engaged herself in early premarital sex which results to her becoming pregnant. She dropped out of school for a while to give birth but unfortunately her baby died shortly after being born. This is when Mary approached our office again to be given second chance as she has learnt her lessons. Being one of our own and still a vulnerable girl we did not hesitate and allowed her continue with her education. She proved us right when her results were out and we are still optimistic that she will be successful in life. We still love her and wish her all the best. BENSON OCHIENG OGUOK is in grade 7: Benson Ochieng is in grade seven at a school called Wagai Primary school. He is a determined boy and a regular boy at school. Benson is looking forward when he will finish his primary learning and join secondary school just like most of his friends. He will be sitting for his examination in the month of March next year before he joins secondary school. Benson wishes to score average marks to enable him join the best schools within the county. We are optimistic with him that he can make it, In his last examination, Benson scored 251 out of 500 marks. This is an average performance and clear evidence that he is a capable boy academically. His father and his other siblings are all doing fine and are in good health. At this season they are working on their farms to earn them food for family consumption. Thank you Covenant UMC for walking with Benson Oguok to this far. We are still looking forward for better life ahead and make him independent through your prayers and support.



SAM OMONDI is in grade 4: Sam is growing a tall boy; he was recruited in the program when he was very tiny and in nursery school. I thank God for him when I see him growing. Sam is now in grade four and he is doing fine health wise and academically. He is showing a great improvement in his academics and he can now write sponsor letter very well with readable English. Initially, the Kenyan System of education was that pupils in primary school will study for eight years before they proceed to secondary school where they take four years and later join university for another four years. None the less the Government decided to change this system, Sam and all grade four pupil are the first lot to embrace this change. They will take six years in primary school and six years in Secondary school. This means that Sam is now remaining with two years to finish his primary level. His grandmother and grandfather are doing fine even though they are having old age health complications. We still thank God for them and standing with Sam when he was left alone when his parents died. Thank you Covenant UMC your sponsorship and prayers has built a lot of impact not only to Sam but to other vulnerable orphans too.

Covenant supports these and 10 other children by sending \$975 per month (\$65/child). The support includes food, healthcare, clothing, schooling and the teaching of Christian principles.
